
#### 9. Describe present and historic physical appearance:

This is a rectangular log structure with a medium- to steeply-pitched gable on its east west axis and measures approximately 25' x 35'. A gabled canopy over the entrance on the south side of the west elevation (supported only by projecting logs at its base) merges with the gabled roof on the south side. A pair of vertical sash windows is positioned in the west elevation north of the entrance. The north elevation has two similar sash windows near the west corner and two windows now boarded almost in the center of the north elevation. That pattern is repeated on the south elevation, but another, inconspicuous entrance is also located on the east corner of the south elevation. The east elevation has no entrances or windows. A metal stove pipe rises through the north face of the gable and extends above the height of the ridge.

Two features are of special note in this structure. One is the corner notches and crowns. Close examination reveals the cornering to have been accomplished by a master craftsperson with very close tolerances. Instead of using copious amounts of mortar to seal the corner saddle notches, the notches themselves have been cut precisely for a tight fit with minimal chinking in the corners. Moreover, the crowns themselves are distinctive in that they are obviously hand hewn with an axe and they are of uneven lengths. The other notable component is the use of logs throughout the construction, including logs of diminishing length that rise all the way to the ridge of each gable, even inside the gable of the canopy over the main entrance. The total effect of the building is thus quite striking. That it was built prior to 1912 and that it remains in excellent condition adds to the quality of the site.


Yasrobi / Moran Cabin. North and west elevations.




Yasrobi / Moran Cabin. Detail. West and south elevations.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

This handsome structure has already lived several lives yet appears ready to continue to serve well indefinitely. The precise date of construction has not been established, although it is known that the building existed prior to 1912. Photographs evidently show the building in that year. It was built in the town of Moran and served as a residence in that community. Ben Sheffield, already alert, as a hunting guide, to the demand of well-to-do hunters and tourists from the East for the Jackson Hole experience, in 1903 purchased the Lovell ranch and proceeded to build the lodge and other services that became the nucleus of the town of Moran. The initial threat to the town of Moran was actually the Bureau of Reclamation which constructed and reconstructed the dam; ultimately it secured a portion of Sheffield's property only through condemnation proceedings. Sheffield himself sold his property in 1928, but the town remained, and indeed, thrived. Bypassed during the initial Rockefeller purchase of private lands inside the proposed park, the town of Moran became part of the Grand Teton National Park in 1950 and the various buildings, including this one, were sold and many, not including this one, were removed during the following decade. Having survived the threats of the Bureau of Reclamation and then the Snake River Company purchases, this building then became property of the park and was used as a fishery laboratory near the dam. Markings on the walls still indicate that use on the interior. In the 1970s the building, finally, was moved from the Moran area and was intended as a dorm on the Elk Refuge; instead, though, it was subsequently used as a museum for the Elk Refuge. When it was no longer being used, its fate seemed sealed and there was talk of burning the structure if a buyer could not be found. At the eleventh hour Zia and Millie Yasrobi purchased the building and moved it to its present location and out of harm's way.


